# A message from Fr Alan...

Oppose Assisted Suicide: Please continue to write to Peers.

The Leadbeater assisted suicide Bill is currently progressing through the House of Lords. The Bill passed its Third Reading in the House of Commons on 20 June by just 23 votes (314–291), a significant reduction from its 55-vote majority at the Second Reading.

Because it is neither a Government Bill nor part of any manifesto, the Lords are fully entitled to heavily amend, time-out, or reject this dangerous Bill. This means the **Leadbeater assisted suicide Bill can still be defeated**.

In its two-thousand-year history, the Catholic Church has always affirmed that human life must be defended from conception until natural death. Thus, according to the Catechism of the Catholic Church, "Intentional euthanasia, whatever its forms or motives, is murder. It is gravely contrary to the dignity of the human person and to the respect due to the living God, his Creator" (CCC 2324).

In keeping with the teaching of Holy Mother Church, we can still act to defend the dignity of every person and oppose this bill in the House of Lords.

Writing letters to **Peers in the House of Lords** making them aware of the dangers of the bill and our concerns about it is an extremely effective means of opposing it. We must remember that Peers do not represent constituents and are not elected by the public. Our communications to Peers must be prudent, polite, and focused. As Catholics we must always approach everyone with charity.

While emails are used extensively in our lives today, **sending a physical letter** carries a unique weight, especially with Members of the House of Lords. A printed, signed letter is a tangible, personal form of communication that is often viewed by Members of the House of Lords as more deliberate and impactful, making it harder to ignore. Right to Life UK have updated their letter generation tool to assist us in **creating personalised letters to Peers** – each focused on one area of concern. You then **print**, **sign**, **and post them**. **This QR code takes you to this latest version of the tool**, **which helps you write to more than three Peers at once**.

Please consider writing to Peers using this tool and stand up for life!

Please also note that on occasion it may be necessary to change the date or time allocated to a particular intention for reasons out of our control. #### INSTRUCTIONS FOR REGULAR SACRAMENTS

With all sacraments, we do try to accommodate the needs of the individual or couple seeking to celebrate in our Cathedral. However, we are bound by the Rite of the Catholic Church in terms of liturgy and music. The priest or deacon assigned to work with you will guide you as much as possible. In general, eulogies are NOT part of the Catholic rite of Funerals and, as such should be deferred to the crematorium or a suitable gathering of loved ones after the funeral.

Our Director of Music will assist you with appropriate music that matches the dignity of the service and is appropriate to the Cathedral - this will be from a choice of sacred music generally played on the cathedral organ (no pre-recorded music).

All readings in the Cathedral must come from Sacred Scripture - poems and prose that do not comply with this should be used at the reception after the service.

#### **BAPTISMS**

**Infant Baptisms** - baptism is the joy-filled initiation into the Christian life and is celebrated as a public event within the community. The Sacrament of Baptism takes place on the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> Saturday of the month at 11:30am. This is a joint celebration with up to three other families. Baptism preparation classes are held on the last Saturday of every month from 4.30pm - 5.15pm. This needs to be booked, in advance, through the parish office.

**Adult Baptisms** - generally take place at the Easter Vigil and conferred by the Bishop in his Cathedral. Candidates will need to undergo adult instruction classes for at least five months (usually starting in late September). Classes take place every Friday evening from 7pm - commencing in September.

Baptisms do not take place during the seasons of Advent and Lent. For all Baptism enquiries, please contact the parish office.

#### WEDDINGS

A minimum of 6 months' notice is required of any marriage taking place in the cathedral. Wedding couples should be resident within the parish boundaries or have some strong link to the cathedral. Please **do not** make any arrangements nor book any venue or make any concrete plans until you have secured a wedding date.

There is a three-fold requirement for marriage preparation; Catechetical and Liturgical preparation (a marriage instruction course at the cathedral toward the middle of January as well as a one-day course in Newmarket), Civil paperwork (through the townhall) as well as documentation required by the Catholic Church for the chancery and parish registers. This applies whether you are planning to be married in the Cathedral or if you plan to marry in a different location.

#### **FUNERALS**

At St John's Cathedral, funerals take place during the weekday 10am Mass. The Cathedral is generally booked through your funeral director - so please speak to them first about your needs and they will contact the Cathedral on your behalf.
