## A message from Fr Alan...

I am sure that, like me, you were deeply saddened and disturbed by the attack on the synagogue in Manchester as the community were celebrating Yom Kippur. Thankfully, because of the courage of some of those attending, the attacker was unable to gain access into the synagogue to fulfil his aim of destruction and murder. Please keep our Jewish brothers and sisters in your prayers as they, as a community, come to terms with this hate crime and terrorist activity. A reminder to all of us to be vigilant of those around us and of any worrying behaviour around the cathedral campus.

There is always a buzz around the cathedral at this time of the year when all of us, staff, volunteers and parishioners return from places afar and return to the regular pace of home-life. I like to hope that St John's Cathedral offers a place of familiarity and comfort to those returning and that familiarity transpires into thoughts of homecoming and comfort.

One of the privileges for me at this time of the year is being involved with the schools in this parish and their return to school and daily life...now there IS pure excitement and joy which is quite infectious. We begin with the whole of Notre Dame High School [approx 1500] walking over to the cathedral for Mass and how the whole city seems to be buzzing with the sight of all of these students walking to the cathedral. I have had quite a few people stop me and comment positively on the behaviour and politeness of the students as they make their way to Mass. It is a busy day for our volunteers and the Heritage department as, after Mass, some of the year levels stay behind at the cathedral for a talk on how faith plays such an important part in the life of the cathedral. We also get involved with the synagogue across the street and I do thank them for their gracious assistance. We then have the all-schools Mass where representatives from across the diocese come to celebrate Mass at the cathedral with Bishop Peter and priests from the various parishes in attendance. Finally, I went to St Francis of Assisi school yesterday to celebrate an early feast day Mass for St Francis. Many children were dressed as animals or in party clothes for the day and they had spent the morning doing more creative things rather than school lessons.

This Saturday, 04 October, we host the national gathering of the Warriors of Mary - part of the mission of the Polish Chaplaincy. The Warriors of Mary attend this cathedral regularly as part of our worshipping community as well as joining together as a group on the first Saturday of every month to celebrate Mass in Polish as well as praying the rosary and hosting a conference. I love the vibrancy they bring to the cathedral and joy they bring in their celebration along with a deep-rooted faith. I welcome each and every one of them to the cathedral this weekend along with their Polish chaplains.

### INSTRUCTIONS FOR REGULAR SACRAMENTS

With all sacraments, we do try to accommodate the needs of the individual or couple seeking to celebrate in our Cathedral. However, we are bound by the Rite of the Catholic Church in terms of liturgy and music. The priest or deacon assigned to work with you will guide you as much as possible. In general, eulogies are NOT part of the Catholic rite of Funerals and, as such should be deferred to the crematorium or a suitable gathering of loved ones after the funeral.

Our Director of Music will assist you with appropriate music that matches the dignity of the service and is appropriate to the Cathedral - this will be from a choice of sacred music generally played on the cathedral organ (no pre-recorded music).

All readings in the Cathedral must come from Sacred Scripture - poems and prose that do not comply with this should be used at the reception after the service.

#### **BAPTISMS**

**Infant Baptisms** - baptism is the joy-filled initiation into the Christian life and is celebrated as a public event within the community. The Sacrament of Baptism takes place on the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> Saturday of the month at 11:30am. This is a joint celebration with up to three other families. Baptism preparation classes are held on the last Saturday of every month from 4.30pm - 5.15pm. This needs to be booked, in advance, through the parish office.

**Adult Baptisms** - generally take place at the Easter Vigil and conferred by the Bishop in his Cathedral. Candidates will need to undergo adult instruction classes for at least five months (usually starting in late September). Classes take place every Friday evening from 7pm - commencing in September.

Baptisms do not take place during the seasons of Advent and Lent. For all Baptism enquiries, please contact the parish office.

#### WEDDINGS

A minimum of 6 months' notice is required of any marriage taking place in the cathedral. Wedding couples should be resident within the parish boundaries or have some strong link to the cathedral. Please **do not** make any arrangements nor book any venue or make any concrete plans until you have secured a wedding date.

There is a three-fold requirement for marriage preparation; Catechetical and Liturgical preparation (a marriage instruction course at the cathedral toward the middle of January as well as a one-day course in Newmarket), Civil paperwork (through the townhall) as well as documentation required by the Catholic Church for the chancery and parish registers. This applies whether you are planning to be married in the Cathedral or if you plan to marry in a different location.

#### **FUNERALS**

At St John's Cathedral, funerals take place during the weekday 10am Mass. The Cathedral is generally booked through your funeral director - so please speak to them first about your needs and they will contact the Cathedral on your behalf.
