A message from Fr Alan...

Remembrance Sunday: I seem to remember commemorating Remembrance Day from a fairly young age (secondary school at least) and then regularly every year of my adult life. At school, the head bugler was charged with playing The Last Post as the flags were lowered to half-mast and the whole school stood in the hot African sun holding the two-minutes' silence. It was always taken very seriously by the staff and the students; I guess because most of us had parents who were born during the war (war babies) and/or grandparents who actually served in the war.

I do not believe that the commemoration and remembering our war dead has diminished by any measure even in these modern times - but, let's face it, the 2nd World War, billed as the war to end all wars, certainly brought about a degree of peace, but wars have rumbled on ever since and we never seem to learn what a senseless waste of life all of this is for the men and women in our armed forces. As the tally in Ukraine and Russia moves into the 100s of 1000s, I do hope that, as a nation, when we pause on Sunday for a moment of silence that we remember the casualties and the dead of ALL wars.

Bishop Peter and I will stand at the war memorial outside city hall and lay a wreath on behalf of the diocese and then walk on to the Anglican Cathedral for a period of silence and prayer. I thank Fr Denys for celebrating the Remembrance Day Mass at 11:00 on Sunday.

Window Appeal: I thank you for your ongoing generosity in helping me to save the stained-glass window in the sunken chapel. To date we have raised £4,573.50 out of a total of £20 200 +VAT. Please do not worry of we exceed this target as we have plenty more windows that will need to be repaired and cleaned in the years ahead. There is an icon on the Dona machines - please do consider Gift Aid if you are a UK taxpayer.

Gaza: A final note of thanks for your tremendous support for the Gaza appeal. I was informed this week that there was an additional £2000 that had been donated via the account we use for 'collections' that was earmarked for the Gaza appeal. This amount has gone directly to the Equestrian Order of the Holy Sepulchre of Jerusalem and will be used, in its entirety for work in Gaza. As a parish we raised well over £4 000 - thank you very much for your tremendous generosity

READINGS AT MASS

First reading

Sunday 9th November 2025 Ezekiel 47:1-2, 8-9, 12

'I saw water flowing from the Temple, and all to whom this water came were saved.'

In those days: The angel brought me back to the door of the Temple, and behold, water was issuing from below the threshold of the Temple towards the east (for the Temple faced east). The water was flowing down from below the south end of the threshold of the Temple, south of the altar. Then he brought me out by way of the north gate and led me round on the outside to the outer gate that faces towards the east; and behold, the water was trickling out on the south side.

And he said to me, 'This water flows towards the eastern region and goes down into the Arabah and enters the sea; when the water flows into the sea, the water will become fresh. And wherever the river goes, every living creature that swarms will live, and there will be very many fish. For this water goes there, that the waters of the sea may become fresh; so everything will live where the river goes. And on the banks, on both sides of the river, there will grow all kinds of trees for food. Their leaves will not wither, nor their fruit fail, but they will bear fresh fruit every month, because the water for them flows from the sanctuary. Their fruit will be for food, and their leaves for healing.'

Mass Intentions - please be aware that there is still a long wait for Mass intentions, with very few available dates now until the New Year. Please request Mass intentions in good time if a particular date and/or time is required. We thank you for your understanding if your particular choice has not been available.

Fraud Alert – please be aware that the priests of this parish or of any parish within the Diocese should never approach you directly for funds or donations, in particular for personal need. All additional collections will come through an official source, such as the newsletter or through regular donations or on the Dona machine. Be particularly aware of emails requesting gift cards and monetary donations. This will never be a valid form of collecting for the church. Should you receive such an email, please contact the parish office in the first instance and ignore the request.



INSTRUCTIONS FOR REGULAR SACRAMENTS

With all sacraments, we do try to accommodate the needs of the individual or couple seeking to celebrate in our Cathedral. However, we are bound by the Rite of the Catholic Church in terms of liturgy and music. The priest or deacon assigned to work with you will guide you as much as possible. In general, eulogies are NOT part of the Catholic rite of Funerals and, as such should be deferred to the crematorium or a suitable gathering of loved ones after the funeral.

Our Director of Music will assist you with appropriate music that matches the dignity of the service and is appropriate to the Cathedral - this will be from a choice of sacred music generally played on the cathedral organ (no pre-recorded music).

All readings in the Cathedral must come from Sacred Scripture - poems and prose that do not comply with this should be used at the reception after the service.

BAPTISMS

Infant Baptisms - baptism is the joy-filled initiation into the Christian life and is celebrated as a public event within the community. The Sacrament of Baptism takes place on the 2^{nd} and 4^{th} Saturday of the month at 11:30am. This is a joint celebration with up to three other families. Baptism preparation classes are held on the last Saturday of every month from $4.30 \, \text{pm}$ - $5.15 \, \text{pm}$. This needs to be booked, in advance, through the parish office.

Adult Baptisms - generally take place at the Easter Vigil and conferred by the Bishop in his Cathedral. Candidates will need to undergo adult instruction classes for at least five months (usually starting in late September). Classes take place every Friday evening from 7pm - commencing in September.

Baptisms do not take place during the seasons of Advent and Lent. For all Baptism enquiries, please contact the parish office.

WEDDINGS

A minimum of 6 months' notice is required of any marriage taking place in the cathedral. Wedding couples should be resident within the parish boundaries or have some strong link to the cathedral. Please **do not** make any arrangements nor book any venue or make any concrete plans until you have secured a wedding date.

There is a three-fold requirement for marriage preparation; Catechetical and Liturgical preparation (a marriage instruction course at the cathedral toward the middle of January as well as a one-day course in Newmarket), Civil paperwork (through the townhall) as well as documentation required by the Catholic Church for the chancery and parish registers. This applies whether you are planning to be married in the Cathedral or if you plan to marry in a different location.

FUNERALS

At St John's Cathedral, funerals take place during the weekday 10am Mass. The Cathedral is generally booked through your funeral director - so please speak to them first about your needs and they will contact the Cathedral on your behalf.
