A message from Fr Alan...

Treasury Cabinets: In the back of the cathedral, we have two large display cabinets - it is here that we display items that are seen as valuable to the cathedral and the diocese. Whilst there is nothing of great monetary value on display, they are valuable in terms of the history of our diocese and plotting our growth from the time of the Reformation all the way through to the foundation of the diocese in 1976. My favourite items on display are the recusant chalices (if only they could speak!). Note how they come apart in two pieces so that they could be easily hidden on the person. It is important that we, as Catholics, understand our heritage and the struggles that we have had in order to be able to celebrate Mass and to be able to gather peacefully without fear for our lives. Our history will be analysed in great depth this year as we celebrate the golden jubilee of our diocese. I have planned, along with Dr Richard Maguire, the Lenten Talks for this year, focussing on the early Church in England, through the Reformation and the modern Church up to 1960. Details will follow when we release our Lenten booklets early in February.

The cabinets have been rearranged over the last week into a more logical display and concentrating on various themes [The Mass, Adoration, house calls, diocese...etc]. We cannot fit everything into the cabinets as space is at a premium, however, they look far more organised and less cluttered now. My sincere thanks to Dr Richard Maguire and Mr Peter Thorn for their attention to detail and the time they spent painstakingly rearranging the cabinets. New cards, explaining the history and use of the items, are being compiled.

Windows: The talented artisan who is going to repair, clean and refit the two remaining windows in the sunken chapel visited us this week to scope the works and to decide on a date for the windows to be carefully removed and taken to his workshop. I, for one, will sleep a little easier once the windows have been removed and I know that they are in a safe place and under repair. We have been invited, as a parish, to visit his workshop once work gets underway, so that we can see just how much skill and care is needed to refurbish the windows. Once they are safely in his workshop and he has begun some of the work, the plan is to hire a coach and to take interested parties over to the workshop and maybe stop for a spot of lunch as well. I would imagine that the groups will have to be fairly small, so there might be a few dates available over the months ahead - details to follow. He has also offered to bring his work to the cathedral (once he has a completed pane) and host a talk at the cathedral for those who are unable to travel. Richard, Charley and Sarah are working out the details, and these will be advertised once they have been finalised - in the meantime, we are concentrating on securing the windows.

Thank you to everyone for their generosity towards the repair of these precious windows. I will announce the final amount raised in early February.

Icon of Our lady of Perpetual Help: I have grown accustomed to the new home of the icon now and I enjoy seeing her in the niche as I sit on my chair during Mass. Again, we have had a few donations towards some decent lighting to illuminate the icon in a sympathetic and professional way. This, as you can imagine, is taking some thought so that it is correct for the icon, our cathedral and it is not too obtrusive. Our General Manager, Charley Purves, is working with the electricians and lighting experts to ensure that this happens in due course and that the icon will be displayed in the best way possible. The history of this icon is very significant and a great asset to the cathedral.

And leaving Nazareth he went and lived in Capernaum by the sea, in the territory of Zebulun and Naphtali, so that what was spoken by the prophet Isaiah might be fulfilled: ‘The land of Zebulun and the land of Naphtali, the way of the sea, beyond the Jordan, Galilee of the Gentiles — the people dwelling in darkness have seen a great light, and for those dwelling in the region and shadow of death, on them a light has dawned.’ From that time Jesus began to preach, saying, ‘Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand.’

While walking by the Sea of Galilee, he saw two brothers, Simon (who is called Peter) and Andrew his brother, casting a net into the sea, for they were fishermen. And he said to them, ‘Follow me, and I will make you fishers of men.’ Immediately they left their nets and followed him. And going on from there he saw two other brothers, James the son of Zebedee and John his brother, in the boat with Zebedee their father, mending their nets, and he called them. Immediately they left the boat and their father and followed him.

And he went throughout all Galilee, teaching in their synagogues and proclaiming the gospel of the kingdom and healing every disease and every affliction among the people.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR REGULAR SACRAMENTS

With all sacraments, we do try to accommodate the needs of the individual or couple seeking to celebrate in our Cathedral. However, we are bound by the Rite of the Catholic Church in terms of liturgy and music. The priest or deacon assigned to work with you will guide you as much as possible. In general, eulogies are NOT part of the Catholic rite of Funerals and, as such should be deferred to the crematorium or a suitable gathering of loved ones after the funeral.

Our Director of Music will assist you with appropriate music that matches the dignity of the service and is appropriate to the Cathedral - this will be from a choice of sacred music generally played on the cathedral organ (no pre-recorded music).

All readings in the Cathedral must come from Sacred Scripture - poems and prose that do not comply with this should be used at the reception after the service.

BAPTISMS

Infant Baptisms - baptism is the joy-filled initiation into the Christian life and is celebrated as a public event within the community. The Sacrament of Baptism takes place on the 2nd and 4th Saturday of the month at 11:30am. This is a joint celebration with up to three other families. Baptism preparation classes are held on the last Saturday of every month from 4.30pm - 5.15pm. This needs to be booked, in advance, through the parish office.

Adult Baptisms - generally take place at the Easter Vigil and conferred by the Bishop in his Cathedral. Candidates will need to undergo adult instruction classes for at least five months (usually starting in late September). Classes take place every Friday evening from 7pm - commencing in September.

Baptisms do not take place during the seasons of Advent and Lent. For all Baptism enquiries, please contact the parish office.

WEDDINGS

A minimum of 6 months' notice is required of any marriage taking place in the cathedral. Wedding couples should be resident within the parish boundaries or have some strong link to the cathedral. Please **do not** make any arrangements nor book any venue or make any concrete plans until you have secured a wedding date.

There is a three-fold requirement for marriage preparation; Catechetical and Liturgical preparation (a marriage instruction course at the cathedral toward the middle of January as well as a one-day course in Newmarket), Civil paperwork (through the townhall) as well as documentation required by the Catholic Church for the chancery and parish registers. This applies whether you are planning to be married in the Cathedral or if you plan to marry in a different location.

FUNERALS

At St John's Cathedral, funerals take place during the weekday 10am Mass. The Cathedral is generally booked through your funeral director - so please speak to them first about your needs and they will contact the Cathedral on your behalf.
